First, find some dirt.
 Next, poke holes in the dirt.
 Make each hole about an inch deep.
 Put each seed into a hole,
 and cover it with dirt.



A seed needs water,
 to soften its coat.
 Use a watering can to soak
 the dirt with water.



### Seeds need light, too. Make sure the seeds are someplace where they can be warm.



Take good care of your seeds.
Too much sun or water can be harmful.
But don't let the dirt get too dry.
It is hard work to give your seed the right amount of sun and water.



# What's going on underneath the dirt?

Look at the roots.

The roots take in water and minerals from the soil for food.

Look how the shoot grows up!



Bean plants grow really fast after they sprout.

Look!

The stems and the leaves are out!

 Take a look at this picture to see a bean plant up close.






What do you see now? Are they seeds, fruit or pods? You have green beans to eat. They are full of nutrition, and they are tasty, too!
