First the brothers found an anthill. "Let's kick it down!" said the oldest brother.


"No, leave the poor ants alone!" said the youngest brother.

- But before the Ogre could grab the pearls, one hundred bees flew all around him.




- "You better do what I ask," said the youngest brother.
