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
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• One morning a dog came into Ms. Pratt's classroom. Ms. Pratt was shocked.

Someone knocked on Ms. Pratt's door. Jet jumped up and went to the door. He opened the door for the librarian.


"Jet is a polite dog," said Ms. Pratt. She asked Jet to stay in the classroom.

Jet raised his paw to vote. He voted to visit the fire station. The vote for the fire station won.




It was the end of the school day. Ms. Pratt gave a speech about Jet.

"Jet is a good dog. Jet obeys the rules. He helps others. He cares about safety. Jet gets our best student of the day award."




Ms. Pratt put a heavy, enormous medal around Jet's neck. It was bigger than his name tag. The students were all happy for Jet.

Ms. Pratt put a name tag on Jet's pillow. The students cheered. Jet was the best student in the class.






